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1. Background:

The City of Burnside is a local government area located within the Eastern Adelaide region with an approximate population of 44,000. Characterised primarily by residential areas and being one of the eastern suburbs adjacent to and entering the foothills, it is one of Adelaide's oldest residential areas, well known for its tree lined streets, period architecture and plentiful reserves and gardens. As a Council, the City of Burnside is committed to serving the community in the most cost effective manner possible, while constructing and properly maintaining vital infrastructure for the benefit of existing and future generations.

In 2017 a strategic survey was undertaken to look into key areas to help with the further development of a Community Plan. In 2019, a second and third iteration of the strategic surveys were developed to inform budget and provide detailed insights into residents' views on key service delivery areas and areas for future development. The strategic survey was again conducted in December 2021 to inform Council on various current relevant issues and topics.


This report details the major findings of the research from December 2021 and looks at key differences between segments of the Council population.

2. Aims and objectives:

The results from this survey will be used to inform decision making internally at Council on a number of key topics identified by Council.

Specifically, the research covers the following aspects:

- Community connection, volunteering, and resident wellbeing
- · Passive recreation
- Environmental sustainability
- Support for a 40 km/h local speed limit
- Support for the sale of community land to resolve residential encroachment issues
- Communication and engagement preferences



3. Methodology and Sample

new**focus** conducted a CATI (Computer Assisted Telephone Interview) survey with residents in the City of Burnside Council area and supplemented this with an online sample gathered via Council's website. Residents from CATI were randomly selected from LGA (Local Government Area) postcodes drawn from the White Pages. Random sampling secured a good mix of respondents as well as providing the chance for every household in the area to be selected to respond to the survey.

The sample was stratified by age, gender and ward (based on ABS 2016 Census Data). During the fieldwork a sample of 850 respondents was achieved (n=50 from online sampling). The table below outlines the accuracy levels for the achieved unweighted sample relative to the total population in the City of Burnside Council area.

- 1 Estimated Resident Population 2016 (Community Profiles, ABS data). See Appendix 1 for weighting information
- 2 Accuracy at one point in time refers to the accuracy of results for a sample compared to what we expect from the total population. Calculation of the level of accuracy is based on the size of the population that the sample is drawn from and increases as the size of the sample approaches the size of the population (census).
- 3 The calculation of accuracy over time is based on the sample size taken at each point in time. This accuracy level tells the percentage difference between the samples at each point in time that is required, before a statistically significant difference will be found, with the sample size obtained.

Fieldwork was conducted between 25th November 2021 and 17th of December 2021, with the main CATI component conducted by 11 interviewers from the new**focus** inhouse field team. The research was carried out in compliance with International Standard AS ISO 20252:2012, meeting the requirements of the Privacy (Market and Social Research) Code 2014 under the Australian Privacy Principles, and the AMSRS Code of Professional Behaviour. 10% of CATI interviews were validated by a field supervisor.

The survey lasted an average of 16 minutes (excluding n=3 very large outliers from the online sample). The survey instrument can be found in Appendix 2 of this report.

Interpretation of Report

How results are reported

Tables and charts are reported in percentage results. Due to rounding some scores may range from 99% to 101%.

n = value

The n= value in the tables and charts represents the total number of respondents included in the study and the number of respondents that answered a specific question (excluding 'don't know' responses except where noted).

n ~ value

In some cases n~ is used. This represents the average number of respondents across two or more questions.

Use of top/bottom-two box terminology

- top-2-box (T2B) refers to combined responses of satisfied/very satisfied, agree/strongly agree, somewhat/very important etc
- bottom-2-box (B2B) refers to combined responses of dissatisfied/very dissatisfied etc

Statistically significant differences

All changes reported as "significant" in this report indicate statistically significant differences.


A cross-tabulation or Z-test is a common method of describing whether a relationship exists between two or more variables, i.e. it allows us to statistically test whether the differences we note in the sample are genuine differences or simply chance occurrences.

Relationships are said to be statistically significant (referenced later in the report as "significant" or "stat. sig.") if the P value (Z-test statistic) is less than the chosen significance level. For example, if .05 (5%) is selected as that level, a P value less than .05 implies that there is a relationship between the two variables that have been cross-tabulated. The only outcomes which have been reported on are those found to be statistically significant at P< .05.




Community Connection

- The large majority of residents think that it is important to feel connected to their community and slightly fewer attest to feeling this sense of connection. There is room to improve perceptions around Council's role in fostering this.
- Females placed higher importance on community connection but did not feel a sense of it more than males, nor were they more satisfied with Council's efforts in this space.
- Some other demographical differences were seen on these metrics:
 - Importance: lower among under 35 y.o. and 85+ y.o.
 - Feeling connected: highest for Burnside and Rose Park and Toorak Gardens residents
 - Satisfaction with Council in this area: Highest among older residents (75 plus) but lower among those 55-64



Suggestions for how Council may improve community connection

- Almost 1 in 3 were not able to provide suggestions on how Council may help residents feel a stronger sense of community or connection with others in the area, and a further 1 in 10 mentioned that they were already satisfied
- 66% of those aged 85 plus were not able to suggest how Council could improve in this area
- 35-44 y.o. residents were more likely to suggest having more small scale events, whereas large scale events were more popular suggestions among this cohort <u>and</u> those under 35, as well as females (16% vs. 8% for males)
- Those aged under 35 were more likely to desire community programs and activities (25%)




Community connection as it relates to living with a disability

- Those aged 44 or under were less likely to live with or know someone living with a disability in the Burnside area.
- 1 in 3 did not know how Council could improve to assist those with a disability to feel more connected to their community, and 10% went further by stating that no improvement is needed.
- In terms of suggestions to improve, differences by age group, gender or ward were seldom seen.



Suggestions to improve community connection for those living with a disability




Passive recreation within the City of Burnside

- 9 in 10 appear satisfied with the amount of passive recreation opportunities in their area:
 - Higher endorsement was seen among those under 35 (95%).
 - Lower endorsement was seen among those living in the Eastwood and Glenunga ward (84%).
 - Older residents 75 plus were more likely to be unsure (approximately 1 in 10), which suggests that these groups are less aware of their options and/or are less physically active due to their age.
- The majority of residents appear content with Council on this domain, with 25% specifying that they are already encouraging passive recreation at a suitable level, and 21% unsure of how improvements could be made.
- Among the remaining proportion of residents, improving the quality and/or quantity of outdoor facilities was the top suggestion, followed by greater promotion of available activities. This reflects the findings from the strategic research undertaken mid-2021 on passive recreation in the area.
- Differences by ward, gender and age were not notable.




Top suggestions on how Council can better facilitate residents' passive recreation activities




Resident wellbeing

- Residents feel safe living in Burnside, including the elderly, with those 75 plus having higher satisfaction than the overall sample
- Lower rated, but still with good levels of satisfaction, concerned personal life achievements, future security, and access to sports and leisure facilities.
- The latter appears more in Council's control, and they could therefore consider ways to improve accessibility to these types of facilities and activities. Here, focus could initially be on provision of suitable sports and leisure options for the oldest age cohort of 85+ y.o. residents, as reported lower satisfaction (7.4).
- This older cohort also had lower satisfaction on several metrics, and while less can be done for factors like one's health quality
 (naturally deteriorates with advanced age), Council could look at ways to improve 85+ y.o. residents' access to transportation (7.6
 average satisfaction vs. 8.2 in the overall community).
- Majority of residents were not able to provide suggestions for how Council could assist in this domain (with around 1 in 3 satisfied).




Top suggestions to improve general wellbeing



Volunteering

- Around 1 in 3 are either interested in volunteering in the community (18%) or are already doing so (17%).
- Current volunteers in the community are more likely to be aged 65-74 (33%), which aligns with this group being more likely to be recently retired.
- Those most interested in volunteering (but not currently doing so) are more likely to be 45-54 years old (31%).
- Interestingly, results did not differ by gender.
- Suggestions for Council to assist those open to volunteering (but not yet doing so) were closely linked to communication and promotion – and not so much the creation – of volunteering opportunities.
- · Other suggestions included:
 - Providing opportunities outside work hours (6%)
 - Providing more detailed information (6%)
- 16% were unable to provide a suggestion.
- Those open to starting to volunteer were most interested in biodiversity/conservation programs, libraries (more so among females), community gardens, and community connection programs (latter less popular among Eastwood and Glenunga residents).

Top suggestions on how Council could assist people to start volunteering







Environmental sustainability actions

- Recycling is almost universally undertaken by residents, but appears somewhat lower among those of advanced age (93%), which is perhaps due to aged care staff doing this on their behalf.
 - Consistent with this possibility, 85 plus y.o. were less likely to perform other actions such installing solar or working towards being carbon neutral.
- Use of higher efficiency appliances increased with age up to 55-74 years (91%), before declining and again being lowest among those 85 and over (66%).
- Males and females did not often differ in their actions, but composting was more common among females (66%) than males (58%).
- Speaking of composting, this practice was higher among Burnside ward residents (72%) than in other wards.
- Suggestions on how Council could assist residents to become carbon neutral included providing information on what this means (32%) and/or providing tips and pointers on becoming carbon neutral (23%).


Environmentally friendly actions (Prompted)




Planting trees on one's property

- Only 13% appear opposed to planting trees on their property.
- Consideration to plant trees was highest among 45-54
 y.o. residents and decreased with increased age to just 3% among those 85 and over.
- All demographic cohorts had large proportions who had already planted some trees but would not consider further planting – a positive result overall, but it is not known what proportion could be planting more and what proportion simply have no room to do so.
- Providing organic materials to plant trees was the top suggestion provided, and was more commonly made by 35-44 y.o. and 55-64 y.o. residents.
- Information on the benefits of tree planting/preservation was also a popular theme emerging from the research, and was higher among those under 35, which suggests that younger residents are less educated on this topic.
- Gender differences were not generally seen, but males more often mentioned the need to educate new home buyers on tree maintenance, whereas females were greater advocates for financial support for tree maintenance.

Suggestions for Council engagement on tree planting & preservation




Planting other indigenous vegetation on one's property


- 1 in 4 residents would not consider planting indigenous vegetation on their property, with 2 in 5 already having done so and not wishing to plant more
- Similar to trees, consideration increased up to 54 years of age before declining.
- Consideration to plant/plant more indigenous plant life was highest among 45-54-year-olds (49%), mirroring the result for trees (42%).

- The top suggestions mirrored that of trees (see previous page), but were actually more often made by residents, suggesting that there is both increased demand for this type of seeding materials from Council, as well as information on the benefits of indigenous vegetation.
- Desire for more information was highest among those aged under 35 at 63%, whereas 35-44and 55–64-year-old residents more often suggested the provision of seedlings etc. from Council.
- Suggestions to subsidise the cost of seeds/seedlings/plants were more common among 35-54 y.o. residents, which could imply purchase intent among these cohorts.

Consideration – Planting other indigenous vegetation on one's property




Suggestions for Council engagement on other planting & preservation




Satisfaction with preservation and maintenance of the tree canopy in streets and reserves within the Burnside area

- 3 in 4 residents appear satisfied or very satisfied with how trees are maintained and preserved in streets and reserves.
- Preservation and maintenance activities appear to be well dispersed across the municipality, with no notable difference in satisfaction (T2B combined satisfied/very satisfied results) across wards.
- Residents with somewhat lower satisfaction (T2B) were 55-64 y.o. (66%) and 65-74 y.o. (68%), whereas younger residents under 35 appear the most satisfied (87% T2B).

Support for 40 km/h speed limit introduction on local roads




Kensington

- Only 1 in 3 residents appear to strongly support the introduction of a lower speed limit on local roads, with roughly 1 in 3 relatively neutral, and the remaining third strongly opposed.
- Eastwood and Glenunga ward residents surveyed were more in favour (45%), whereas Beaumont residents were less in favour (23%) – this may present a challenge for Council as these two wards share borders with one another.
- Opposition was higher among males (43%) than females (32%).
- Overall, there appears division in the community on this topic, and pursuing a speed limit reduction on local roads will likely need to carefully argue the benefits to those less in favour of this change.

Sale of community land for encroachment resolution

- Majority of residents surveyed indicated being opposed to selling community land to resolve residential encroachment issues.
- Opposition was highest among those living in the Kensington Park ward (60%), and highest among those 55-64 years (73%).
- Younger residents appear to be less knowledgeable on this topic, with 51% of under 35 y.o. residents not able to take a stance either way (also relatively high among 35-44 y.o. at 39% unsure).

Support for community land sales to resolve residential encroachments




Information preferences around Council business and activities

Over 1 in 2 residents were either already happy with information delivery regarding Council operations or unable to provide suggestions on how to improve in this space.

- Contentment was higher (and increased with age) among older residents aged 65 and over, whereas 'don't know' responses were more common among younger (perhaps less engaged) residents 44 and under.
- For the remaining proportion of residents, there appears relatively high demand for communications concerning planning and development approvals, as well as transparency around expenditure.


Topics and information to make readily available to residents




Involvement in community engagement activities with Council and interest in joining a panel

Involvement in community engagement activities with Council (including via Engage Burnside website feedback) appears low at 13%, but was higher among 45-54 y.o. (22%) and 65-74 y.o. (19%) – perhaps these age groups have more time for involvement due to lifestyle changes (e.g. children leaving home and entering retirement, respectively).

Interest in being involved via a panel




- Interest in being involved via a panel appears more than twice as high as current involvement via various other means (see above), which suggests that this type of engagement is appealing to residents (perhaps due to convenience factors and low time commitment via only having to answer "a few questions a few times a year").
- Panel registration is much more likely to be from 45-54 y.o. residents (52% interested) and 65-74 y.o. residents (39% interested) – the same two age cohorts more likely to already be involved in community engagement activities.

How to engage and gather feedback from residents

- Approximately 1 in 5 residents do not want engagement (5%), are already satisfied with current engagement (5%), or are otherwise unsure about how Council can improve in this space (10%).
 - Older residents 85+ were more likely to fit into one of the aforementioned categories.
- Among those who could offer suggestions, phone and/or email contact appears preferred, followed by paper-based communication, and questionnaires.
 - Phone and/or email contact was more commonly suggested by those 54 and under, whereas letterbox communication was consistent across all age groups.
- Engagement via online channels was not as commonly mentioned, which suggests that engagement to inform future planning and meeting community needs is seen as less appropriate via public discourse on the internet - rather, it is likely that residents want more direct, private interactions on these matters.

How results are reported

Statistically significant differences

Statistically significant results in data presented in tabular format are indicated through the use of red text (which indicates a statistically significantly higher result compared to results across other segments) or green text (indicates a statistically significantly lower result).

For example, the figure to the right indicates a statistically significantly higher result for Kensington Park and Kensington Gardens & Magill compared to other wards, and a statistically significantly lower results for Eastwood and Glenunga.

Where results are displayed in chart format, statistically significant differences are indicated through the use of ! Where results are higher, and !! Where results are lower compared to other segments.

For example, the figure to the right indicates a statistically significantly higher proportion on Kensington Park residents rated the item as not at all important compared to other wards, while Beaumont recorded a significantly higher proportion of not very important ratings, and Burnside a significantly higher proportion of neither important or unimportant ratings.






Q1 – How important is it to you to feel a sense of community or connection to others in your local area? Is it....



Q2 – How strongly do you agree or disagree that you feel a sense of community or connection with your local community? Do you...




Q3 – How satisfied are you with Council's efforts to help build a sense of community and connection among its residents?







Q22a - Do you support the sale of community land to resolve encroachments from residential structures?






