Mayor's Message



We are fortunate to live in the wonderful City of Burnside. It is a connected, safe, confident and prosperous community, living in an environment where trees are valued and are valuable. Decisions that we make are focused on maintaining and improving the great quality of life we enjoy. Our population continues to change as we cater for the needs of every age and background represented. We do our best to manage our sustainability, make decisions based on needs of the majority and provide a vision for future generations. Our Strategic Plan provides us with the roadmap and we steer our way on our journey to completion.

Another season has passed, and we have had much to celebrate.

We launched the Community Renewables program in late August, which provides access to affordable, high-quality solar and/or battery systems. Many households and businesses within the City of Burnside have already taken advantage of Tindo's exclusive offers, with their experienced team based in Adelaide.

In September, there was the much-awaited opening of Burnside Village's many new stores, which were worth waiting for. Burnside Village is our largest employer and as such provides great opportunities for our local community. The place is spacious, light, bright and when complete will provide even more for the broader South Australian community. It is an excellent legacy from the Cohen family, with its history going back to Richard Cohen's purchase of an old bluestone cottage in Glenside in the 1970s. Richard and Pat, who is now in her nineties, had a vision for this development that has grown exponentially since those early days. Congratulations to everyone involved in this development!

A new initiative began in the Burnside Ballroom for Jazz lovers in September. The Jazz Room established itself in this fine venue with live concerts continuing for the rest of this year and into 2026. It is a great venue for this music. The Regal also showed the AFL Grand Final on the big screen in September.

In October, we celebrated 30 years of the Toy Library, which was originally situated at the Hub in Glenunga. The Hub also recently celebrated the 100th iteration of the Kids Club, a monthly family group full of entertainment for little ones. The Nature Festival was once again a great success with Tree Tags in Kensington Wama / Kensington Gardens Reserve and the Treasure Hunt in Michael Perry Reserve. The Burnside Youth Concert had their cabaret in September and the band had a holiday workshop with 57 young people playing and learning together with excellent support from the Band Committee and their leaders John and Oliver and friends.

October saw the beginning of the bowling season and the new shade covers at Beaumont Bowling Club. We saw the end of the winter swimming season at the George Bolton Swimming Centre and the start of the summer season. The toddlers' playground is now open again with a sunshade over it and those of us who swam during winter really enjoyed the opportunity.

October also saw the Pepper Street Art Centre turn 30; even though it was originally in the library and since about 1990 in the original old Magill School in Magill Village. At Halloween, we also remembered The Rocky Horror Picture Show at The Regal, celebrating 50 years of the movie that played every Friday night during the eighties when it was called the Chelsea.

In November, we celebrated Kensington Oval's 150 year birthday. This special event was held to coincide with the Burnside Athletic Carnival, which was also celebrating ten years at this location. Originally known as Shipsters Paddock, this oval was where Sir Donald Bradman played cricket and was the original Olympic Sports field in Adelaide.

The Regal Theatre also celebrated its 100 birthday with fanfare and a special party on 9 November...I do love that place! At the end of this week, our annual Carols in the Park is the biggest event on our calendar.

Finally, Kensington Baseball Club celebrates its 100th season this summer at Newland Reserve. What an amazing three months of achievements!

Congratulations to our Council Information Technology Team for winning the Local Government State Award for its CCTV Solution Project in October.

CEO's Message



As we wind down 2025, my first year at the City of Burnside is coming to a close.

It has been a rewarding year full of firsts for both the city and me.

Following adoption of the 2025/26 budget and update to the long term financial plan (LTFP) in June 2025, Council's finances have returned to a small operating surplus. This places Council on track to achieve its financial sustainability targets in 2026/27.

The city has seen the launch of our incredibly successful Community Renewables Program. Providing simple and affordable access to solar panels and batteries. The uptake of this program has so far been reassuring of the community need for access to high-quality solar installations.

The City of Burnside was also named a Tree City of the World by the Arbor Day Foundation for the sixth year in a row! This recognition reaffirms our commitment to our planting and biodiversity programs.

Outreach to our city's youth has been a major objective during 2025. Since the development of our first ever Youth Actions Plan the City of Burnside has taken an active role in engaging with the city's younger members. Part of this included our first ever GeekFest event, which drew thousands of passionate youths from not only the City of Burnside, but from around Adelaide. While our new Youth Courtyard Sessions are an initiative to engage the next generation of artists and provide them with a platform to perform.

We also introduced the City of Burnside Advocacy Plan – full of projects championed by our Council Members that matter most to you, our community. A significant part of this plan involves seeking further funding opportunities from State and Federal Governments. I have had the pleasure of meeting with numerous members from both levels of government over the previous months to advocate for these projects and the potential funding to help us achieve them.

Looking at 2026, it is my hope that we will be able to continue to build momentum on our Advocacy Plan and continue to seek funding support where possible. This plan represents a bright future for our city, and it is my hope the next 12 months will lead to significant progress for the projects.

2026 Council Elections

2026 Council elections are scheduled to be held in November.

To ensure you can vote or nominate, you must be enrolled on either the state electoral roll or your council's voters roll (also known as the council supplementary roll).

Council elections are your chance to have a voice heard in local decision-making.

You can do this by:

- considering standing for Council
- voting

Voting ensures that you are represented by the people who will be your voice in decision making and can shape the future of our great city. Standing for council gives you the chance to be that voice: to represent your community's needs, champion local causes and help create a more vibrant, inclusive and sustainable City of Burnside for everyone. The community needs you!

Wednesdays and Thursdays: Burnside Village

Friendly volunteers will assist with carrying your shopping bags to your front door. Walking frames and other mobility aides can be accommodated in a secure storage area on the bus. Cost is \$4 for a round trip.

Community Car Program - If you no longer drive, we can provide you with transport in our community cars so that you can attend your appointments and social activities. Priority is given to support people to get to and from medical and health related appointments. Cost is \$4-8 per trip depending on destination.

Regal Theatre Celebrates 100 Years

The Regal Theatre in Kensington Park is one of South Australia's most treasured heritage cinemas and has been a cornerstone of Burnside life for a century.

Currently South Australia's oldest continuously running cinema, the Regal was originally opened in 1925 as the Princess Theatre, it has delighted generations with its timeless charm, captivating performances and rich architectural beauty. Renowned for its striking Art Deco style and intimate single-screen experience, the Regal stands as a rare example of civic-owned entertainment heritage.



Over the decades, it has hosted everything from classic films and local productions to live music, comedy and community events, remaining a vibrant hub where history and creativity meet.

Roberta Ellershaw, daughter of former Ozone Picture Theatre owner Donald Waterman, said the Regal Theatre is a vital part of the history of Burnside.

'It is so good that the Burnside Council decided to restore and maintain the theatre,' Roberta said. 'I lament the fact that we have lost many beautiful theatres around the state, many that have won architectural awards; they were spectacular.'

'Australians so often don't realise how important these are. It is important for my grandchildren to be able to come here and know where I came as a kid.'

Walking through the theatre for the first time in decades, Roberta recalled memories from her childhood and noted the statement pieces of the theatre that remained.

'The staircases are beautiful; the fact that they've kept the railing is fantastic. I remember the ceiling vividly - my father taught me all about the importance of wood with acoustics.'

Well known for promoting community building and for giving tickets away, Roberta said her father Donald and the Waterman family built ties throughout the 1940's both locally and internationally.

'My father personally knew Walt Disney; we have photos of him with Walt,' Roberta said.

Manager of the Regal Theatre, Steve Virgo, said the beauty of the Regal Theatre comes not just from the heritage art deco style, but also from the community passion and collective history within the building.

'We have residents who have been coming here for over 50 years. Others, like Roberta, who haven't been here in decades and use it as a moment to reminisce. It is a special place for a lot of people,' Steve said.

Burnside Celebrates the Regal Theatre in Style

On 9 November 2025, the City of Burnside, rolled out the red carpet and invited the community to step back in time for a dazzling celebration of the Regal Theatre's 100th birthday. The iconic venue came alive with a roaring 1920's-themed birthday bash, complete with vintage flair, live entertainment and the screening of *The Great Gatsby*. It was a wonderful tribute to a century of stories, film and community connection, all set in one of Adelaide's most loved cultural landmarks. A Timeline of the Iconic Regal Theatre

- 1925** • Opened 24 November 1925 as the Princess Theatre, designed by Adelaide theatre architect Christopher A. Smith. Owned by National Theatres.
- 1928** • National Theatres entered liquidation. All theatres were taken over by Ozone Amusements Ltd. Name changed from Princess Theatre to Marryatville Ozone.
- 1929** • The theatre was adapted for 'talkies'.
- 1941** • Purchased by the Waterman family and extensively remodeled in an Art Deco style by architect F. Kenneth Milne.
- 1951** • Theatre purchased by Hoyts Group and re-named the Hoyts Ozone, Marryatville.
- 1955** • Original screen removed and replaced with a CinemaScope (an anamorphic lens for widescreen movies) screen.
- 1963** • Ozone was to be sold to Amoco Petrol Company for redevelopment as a petrol station. Led by Mayor George Bolton, Burnside Council purchased the theatre and leased it back to Hoyts.
- 1971** • Management of the theatre was transferred to Wallis Cinema and renamed Chelsea Theatre.
- 1983** • Cinema added to the State Heritage Register.

- 1984** • Burnside Council secured a grant under the Community Employment Programme to renovate the cinema.
Seats reduced from 1145 to 586. New floor, screen, carpet and acoustic equipment was added.
 - 2009** • Burnside Council explored the possibility of selling the theatre, but an extensive 'Save the Chelsea' community campaign, which wanted the Theatre to remain under public ownership, caused the Council to abandon the sale.
 - 2011** • City of Burnside implemented a Conservation Management Plan for the Regal Theatre and decided to lease (not sell) the Theatre to a private operator.
 - 2012** • Republic Theatres was awarded the lease, and the theatre was renamed the Regal Theatre.
 - 2017** • City of Burnside took over management of the Regal Theatre.
 - 2020** • The Conservation Management Plan for the Regal Theatre was updated and has been a guide for the recent redevelopments and conservation.
 - 2022** • The Regal Theatre Redevelopment Masterplan is formally endorsed by Burnside Council.
 - 2025** • 100th Anniversary of the Theatre's operation. The Regal Theatre remains the oldest continuously running purpose-built cinema in Adelaide, and the only cinema in the city still outfitted for the screening of silent films.
- Upcoming** • Council is seeking \$5m in State Government funding for the redevelopment of the iconic Regal Theatre and surrounding precinct to match the \$2.43m already committed by the Federal Government. The redevelopment will ensure the future of the Regal as the foremost performing arts theatre and cinema in the eastern suburbs.

A United Voice, the Burnside Advocacy Plan

The City of Burnside's first-ever Advocacy Plan marks a new chapter on how Council champions the priorities that matter most to our community.

This plan takes a strategic approach to engaging with state and federal government decision-makers, securing funding and influencing policies that support the future of Burnside.

In selecting priorities, Council considered factors such as community support, readiness to proceed and city-wide benefit. Council will advocate for initiatives that preserve and enhance the lifestyle, character and liveability of Burnside. The plan outlines key capital projects, ongoing funding initiatives and policy matters shaping Burnside's sustainable growth, along with smaller neighbourhood projects, delivering lasting benefits for all Burnside residents.

One major advocacy priority is the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass (GAFB), a transformative project designed to redirect heavy freight vehicles away from Adelaide and the South Eastern Freeway. This is a part of the wider Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) High Productivity Vehicle Network (HPVN).

Currently, more than 870,000 heavy vehicles travel through the City of Burnside each year along Portrush Road and Glen Osmond Road, passing homes, schools and aged care facilities. Adelaide is the only capital city in Australia where the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator's heavy vehicle network passes through residential suburbs of the city.

National Freight Data Hub statistics from 2018 reveal that an average of 2,404 heavy vehicles travel on Portrush Road and Glen Osmond Road each day, while 273 people have lost their lives or were seriously injured as a result of a road crash on Portrush Road, Glen Osmond Road and the South Eastern Freeway within the City of Burnside boundary.

By diverting this traffic through a new northern freight corridor, the GAFB would significantly improve road safety, reduce noise and air pollution and create safer, more liveable neighbourhoods.

In March 2025 as part of the Federal Budget the Federal Labor government committed \$525m over 10 years to the project.

Council strongly supports the project and is advocating for the State Government to match the Federal Government's commitment, ensuring this vital infrastructure becomes a reality. Through continued collaboration and advocacy, Council aims to protect the wellbeing of our residents and promote a safer, cleaner and more connected Burnside.

At the current time, Council is gathering community transport data that will inform a case for consideration by the Minister for Infrastructure and Transport and the Department of Infrastructure and Transport.

Michael Drives Inclusion in Burnside with Sports4All

For Michael Zannis, sport has always been more than just a game. Losing his sight at the age of six, he discovered early on the power of sport to build confidence, community and opportunity.

Now, as Burnside’s Sports4All Inclusion Coach, Michael is helping ensure that the same opportunity is open to everyone in the Burnside community.

Sports4All is a multi-award-winning, nationally recognised program dedicated to building more inclusive grassroots sport across Australia. Michael brings a wealth of experience, passion and lived expertise to the role, making him an ideal advocate for local clubs and schools.

A long-time member of the Australian Blind Cricket Team, Michael is the most capped Australian Blind Cricketer with 98 appearances and has represented South Australia more than 160 times. Off the pitch, his contribution to sport is just as impressive, volunteering on boards and committees including Blind Sports SA, Blind Cricket and the South Australian Cricket Association.

With more than 25 years in the disability sector, Michael has always worked towards making sport more accessible for all. He has previously founded a charity to help fund athletes with disability to travel to national and international events.

‘I’m very passionate about helping those with a disability be involved in sport and educating local sporting clubs and schools to feel more comfortable including people with disability in their community,’ Michael said.

Through Sports4All, Michael works directly with clubs and schools across Burnside, sitting down with committees, coaches and staff to identify gaps and create action plans for inclusion.

‘Sometimes it is as simple as knowing that people with a disability are people first. Treating everyone as a person is the most important thing. The most basic step is, if you are unsure, ask them how you can assist.’

For local families, this means more opportunities for children and adults with disability to get involved in sport - whether as players, supporters, or volunteers. The program looks at everything from facilities and coaching, to building the confidence of clubs themselves, ensuring environments where everyone feels welcome.

Michael hopes Burnside can set the standard for inclusive sport. ‘We already have a few local clubs and schools getting involved and leading the way, and my hope is that all organisations will work together to provide pathways for people with disability to participate. Whether that’s on the court, in the clubrooms, as members, or even on committees.’

Across Burnside, residents and local businesses are embracing South Australia's clean energy future by choosing local solar technology and accessing the Federal Government's *Cheaper Home Battery Program*.

Burnside's Community Renewables Program Takes Off!

Council's Community Renewables Program helps residents and businesses install solar and battery systems at their properties. The program offers exclusive deals with a trusted local supplier and aims to make the transition to clean energy easier, helping the community reduce energy costs while contributing to a more sustainable future.

As part of the program, Adelaide-based manufacturer Tindo Solar is offering a special 'Burnside-only' package to support residents and businesses making the switch to clean energy. The offer includes:

- A free upgrade to premium all-black solar panels (valued at around \$400)
- A free installation warranty upgrade to 10 years (valued at around \$750)
- An exclusive solar system discount for Burnside customers (average \$513 value)
- An additional \$250 off Tindo's best available price on German-made sonnen batteries
- A dedicated service line and priority support for Burnside customers
- Access to Government rebates, flexible payment options and the ability to join a Virtual Power Plant (VPP) for additional savings!

Together, these benefits provide over \$1,900 in added value for Burnside residents and businesses.

Through Council's Community Renewables Program, dozens of Burnside households have already chosen Adelaide-based manufacturer Tindo Solar to install Australian-made solar panels. The initiative is helping residents lower their energy bills while supporting South Australian jobs and local manufacturing.

To date, more than 100 Burnside households have invested over \$2.3m in tailored energy solutions comprising nearly 1,500 locally manufactured solar panels and over 1.4MW of battery storage.

Beulah Park residents Simran and Stuart said the decision to upgrade their old system with a battery, inverter and new panels was an easy one.

'It was all about making our system more efficient and reducing our power bills,' they said.

Curious to see how Tindo's solar panels are made?

Participants will have the chance to see the production process up close, hear from local solar experts, and learn how this South Australian manufacturer is helping drive the shift toward circular, low-carbon industries.

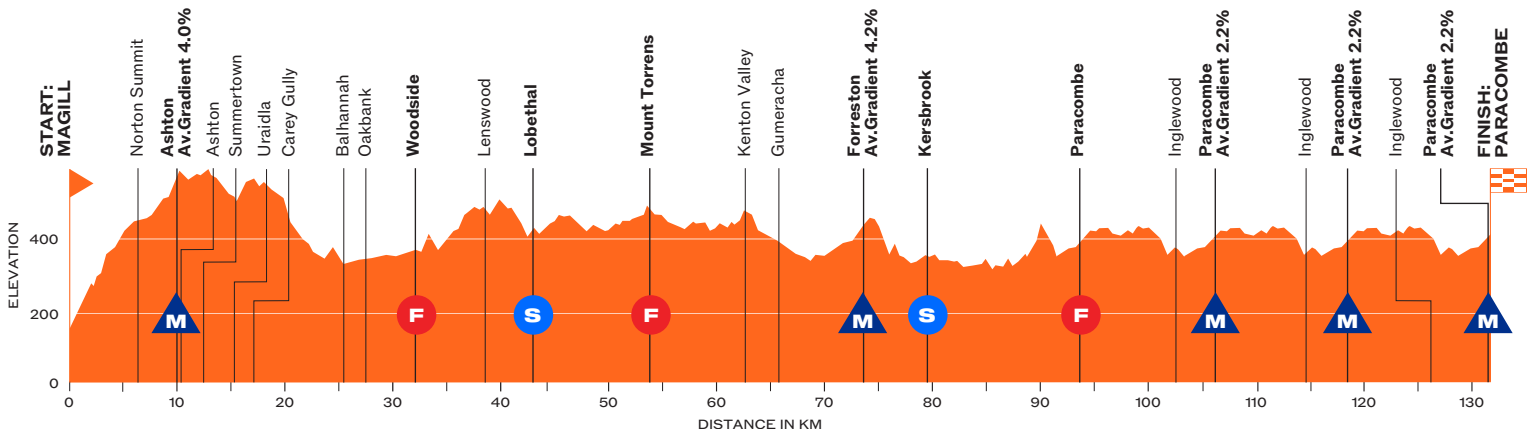
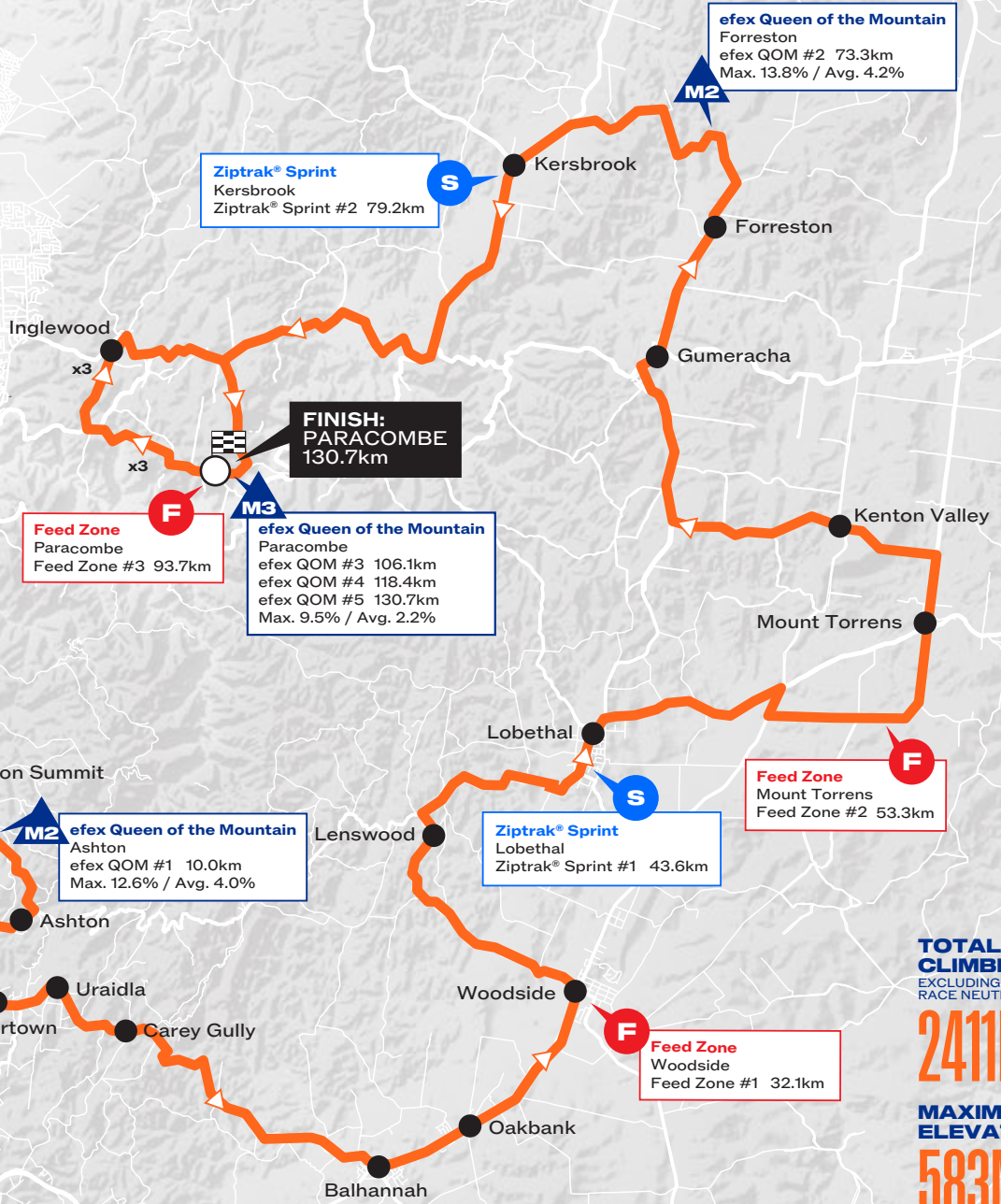

It's amazing that as soon as the Council budget has been determined, the next one is soon upon us. For the next budget in 2026/2027, a key discussion item for our Ward is the traffic management precinct plan for the area north of Greenhill Road taking in the suburbs of Burnside (North), Erindale, Stonyfell and Wattle Park. Other precincts closer to the CBD within the city have already had their draft plans formulated with the assistance of local residents. We believe strongly that residents have a better understanding of the traffic issues in the Ward and we will be relying on their views to help determine solutions from a holistic standpoint.

Due to the urgency of traffic concerns at the Hallett Road/ Greenhill Road intersection and the southern portion of Lockwood Road, plans have already been enacted there, however, we remain open to further "tweaking" of those plans, if necessary in the future.

But first, we need to have a budget approved before the community consultation process begins. In the meantime, please do think about possible solutions to help alleviate the rat-running that is occurring in the precinct above, which may include traffic calming measures, road closures, prohibiting left or right turns at certain times of the day, installation of traffic lights and the list goes on. Also, the effect on Burnside South residents must be front of mind when considering any suggestions you have.

Included in the precinct planning are the general issues of accessibility for pedestrians and cyclists as well as the maintaining of streetscapes and the preservation of habitat corridors within our Ward.

It is well worth a visit to our Community Garden at 31 Laurel Avenue - the Pirkuna Wirra/ Peter Bennett Organic Community Garden.

Opened in 2021, this was the former site of the Council propagation nursery. After extensive community consultation and much hard work by dedicated volunteers, it is a patchwork of raised vegetable beds, fruit trees and flowers. There is a pergola for shade, a rainwater tank for thirsty plants, a children's cubby house and plenty of seating so that anyone can relax and enjoy the tranquillity while watching everything grow. The gates are open from dawn to dusk, seven days a week, so do drop in for a wander!

Council has committed to a Stonyfell Tree Planting trial in the 2025/2026 financial year, recognising that tree establishment in Stonyfell has been more challenging than in other parts of the City due to the rocky skeletal soil in the area.

The trial will test three different planning “treatments”, ie improved soil treatment, new species selection and standard planting. At least 10 trees will be planted for each “treatment” and over the next two years survival, growth and tree health will be evaluated.

Revegetation of the area near the tennis courts at Newland Reserve has been completed during this planting season. The significant native trees around the perimeter have been infilled with young native trees and native understorey planting (shrubs, grasses, ground covers), a mulched buffer strip and a watering system. Thank you to the Burnside team for such a great job!

Prepare, Plan and Stay Informed This Fire Season

The Fire Danger Season generally runs from **1 December 2025 and ends on 30 April 2026** - now is the time to get ready.

Protect your home by clearing gutters, cutting long grass, removing debris and trimming overhanging branches. A well-prepared property is far more likely to withstand a fire front, ember attack or radiant heat.

While most of Burnside is leafy suburbia with low bushfire risk, the eastern edge lies within the Mt Lofty Ranges Fire Ban District – one of the most fire-prone areas in the world. If you live here, make sure you have a written and practiced Bushfire Survival Plan. Remember: leaving early is always the safest option.

Stay informed with the Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AFDRS), which helps you understand daily risk levels - Moderate, High, Extreme or Catastrophic - and what actions to take. Visit bit.ly/CFSAFDRS.

Check the CFS website at www.cfs.sa.gov.au for bushfire behaviour information and planning tools, and visit bit.ly/CoBFire for City of Burnside updates.

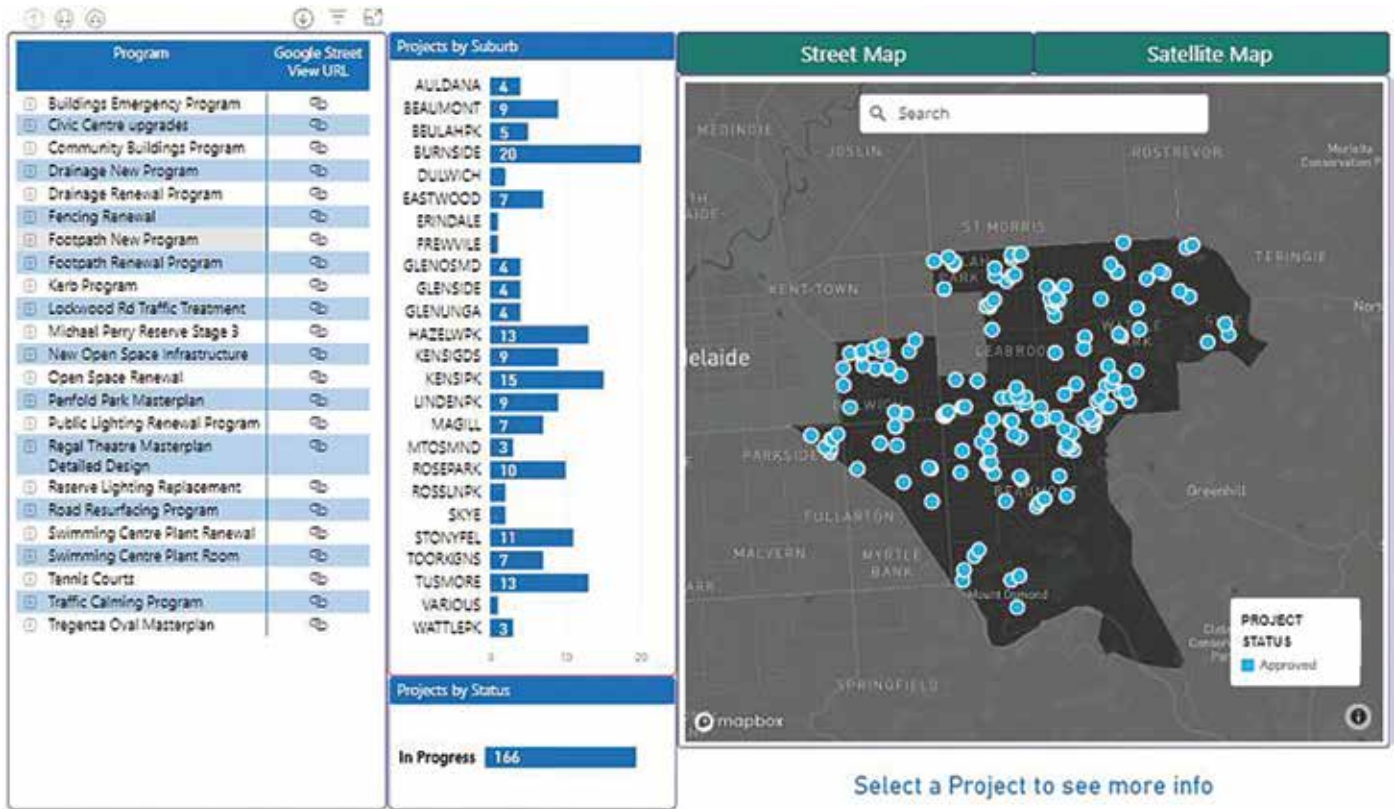
