The Windlewood Story

Karen began exhibiting in the 1980s, quickly establishing a reputation for her creative use of colour and expression, often on large canvases that can best be described as a celebration of life. Her work now resides in collections across the world, bringing people joy every day.

Karen and Dave began travelling widely and frequently, providing Karen with a rich stream of ideas for her work. Also inspired by the experiences, Dave documented the journeys through stories and images. In 2000 he launched a successful parallel career as a freelance travel photojournalist, publishing material around the globe in both print and digital media. The partnership became known as Windlewood, a union of Karen Windle

and Dave Underwood, and the pair began jointly exhibiting using a themebased approach.

Karen and Dave believe the concept of theme-based joint exhibitions brings a unique benefit to both themselves and the audience. The selection of a theme focuses the work but also provides a broader range of interpretations through the two mediums - paintings and photographs - as well as through both male and female perspectives. This helps ensure there is something for everyone and encourages all visitors to share their experiences and perspectives.

"I love fabric... especially recycled, vintage and retro fabrics.

Sitting with my grandmother sewing on buttons from her many containers is an early and fond memory, likely where my lifelong passion for sewing was started. I am fortunate to have inherited those button boxes, which I continue to collect and use!

Making quilts has been one of the longest of my sewing pursuits over the past 30 or more years, followed by bag making about 20 years ago under my label *bagladybags*, which is now my main pursuit.

I love the way unexpected colour combinations work and enjoy mixing things like lace, denim, leather pieces and braids, usually with a touch of bling! My black evening bags are especially fun to make, patching recycled pieces of op-shop acquired laces, for example, into sparkly bags. There is much satisfaction for me in that creative process.

I am always on the lookout for unusual pieces of fabric for the next inspiration. I hope you can pop into Pepper Street during August for a look at my latest range."
