

Artists of the Month:

October Lynette Branson Beaded Jewellery



"I have always had a love of textiles starting at a young age, making dolls clothes and accessories. I have knitted and sewn my own clothes and been a lace maker for a number of years.

I have been beading for approximately 15 years, doing beadweaving with seed beads. I am able to do all beadweaving stitches and bead looming. I now make my own patterns. About four years ago I started bead embroidery. I love the freedom of design this technique offers, and although slower to complete a finished piece, I hope to explore the technique more fully.

I have participated in a number of beading workshops, some by highly regarded international tutors. I also teach bead weaving.

My work is inspired by nature and the world around me. My garden is a major inspiration with the flowers and the birds that visit it. I am privileged to live near the River Torrens and be able to walk along it. Picking up the many and varied leaves that are there have inspired my leaf designs.

I also enjoy making various types of spiral ropes. I find the repetitiveness very soothing.

I only use top quality Japanese and Czechoslovakian beads, freshwater pearls, semi-precious stones, Swarovski crystals and pearls. All findings are sterling silver, gold filled or copper. "

November Alison Cooper Ceramics

"I began working with clay in 1971 at the South Australian School of Art.

The focus of the course was in the attaining of key competencies in ceramics through a disciplined approach to workshop method and practice.

My main influences were Milton Moon and Regina Jaugeitis. Their styles of working with clay are quite different and each encouraged exploration in clay and materials.

From Milton we were introduced to the Leach/Hamada tradition and aesthetic as well as a 'no pain- no gain - don't be precious' work ethic which enabled us to become potters of considerable skill.

Regina led us in exploration of the infinite possibilities of colour and texture in glaze formulation and application. I am very grateful for the education that I had with them.

Since that time I have continued in ceramics mainly in the production of decorative pottery which is wholesaled to galleries. After spending time at the Jam Factory I established my own workshop with the assistance of State and Federal grants.

I have exhibited throughout Australia and won awards. My work is represented in the collections of the Art Gallery of SA and Parliament House in Canberra as well as numerous other public and private collections.

I am continuing to pursue excellence in my work. One day..."
