

# Chequered Copper Butterfly

The Chequered Copper is a beautiful, small butterfly with orange and brown chequered wings. It's a rare South Australian species and has a very special connection to native ants and plants.



# Lifecycle



Eggs are laid on the native sorrel (Oxalis perennans) leaves.



Ants herd the caterpillar to its favourite food and in return they get a sweet drink of honeydew, then they pupate in the ant nest.



Adult butterflies feed on nectar from many different types of flowers.



This male butterfly lived in Beaumont Common, one of our parks.

### Interesting Fact


Chequered Copper caterpillars have ant bodyguards!

#### How can you help?

Plant native sorrel and flowering local native plants in your garden.

## What does it do?

**Caterpillar eats:** Oxalis perennens (native sorrel)



**Butterfly drinks:** Nectar from native flowers

# Flame Sedge-skipper

The Flame Sedge-skipper is a rare and beautiful native butterfly found in the southern most part of Burnside, towards Mt Lofty. It's named for its fiery colouring and its fast, skipping flight.



### Lifecycle



Egg - Laid on the long leaves of local native plants called cutting grass (*Gahnia*).

Caterpillar - Hatches and munches on the leaf, then makes a shelter by folding it with silk.

Pupa - Stays safely inside its leafy hideaway while it transforms.



Adult butterfly - Pops out in warmer months, skips low through the grass, finds a mate, and starts the cycle again!

### Interesting Fact

These butterflies don't fly far or high, they usually stay close to their host plants, *Gahnia*.

#### How can you help?

Protect and plant *Gahnia trifida* or *Gahnia sieberiana* in your local area.

## What does it do?

Caterpillar lives: Inside *Gahnia* plants



**Butterfly eats:** Flower nectar
