Mayor's Message

At the end of June, the CEO and I attended the National Congress of the Australian Local Government Association (ALGA) Canberra. More than 1,300 local government leaders (Mayors, CEOs, Councillors and staff) attended to discuss national priorities such as money for roads, disaster relief, economic sustainability and restoring the one per cent Federal Government Financial Assistance Grants for local councils. The grants had been reduced from one per cent to merely zero-point-five per cent for the level of government that all speakers referred to as the one closest to the people and hence in the best position to provide local solutions for national priorities.

The Conference was opened by the Governor General of Australia, her Excellency the Honourable Sam Mostyn AC, who reflected on her past year in the role. She stated that the capacity of kindness and compassion is the character of modern Australia and that everyone (not just the leaders) needs to play a role to ensure it continues. She said that we need to strengthen our democracy by ensuring that young people are educated about civics and democratic action. She outlined her concerns about the decline in knowledge and understanding of the democratic process, revealing that 50 per cent of Year 6 students had some understanding, but by Year 10 it had declined to only 25 per cent.



I enjoy working with local school students in Burnside to help them understand about civics and the role of democracy in councils. This is an open invitation to all schools who would like to engage.

Federal Government politicians acknowledged that councils play a critical role in supporting their communities and that the role has expanded significantly, as has the financial pressure councils face. That is why ALGA is seeking a return to one per cent and ALGA is also calling for urgent action to ensure the financial sustainability of councils. The Local Government Association of SA has also provided a submission to our own State Government about this matter of urgency.

We have a Strategic Plan for the City of Burnside titled Burnside 2030. It articulates Council's vision, goals and priorities that guide decision making over a 10 year period, ending in 2030. It represents a vision for the City of Burnside that has been informed by the community and guides some of our most important projects and programs. It helps councillors respond to emerging opportunities and challenges. This Plan builds on our past achievements in providing highly valued community services and identifying and preserving those qualities that are uniquely Burnside. It also identifies ways in which we can work together with you, our residents and ratepayers, as well as with all levels of government. Council's work expands to the actions of our subsidiaries like East Waste and Eastern Health Authority.

We also work alongside five other councils in the Eastern Regional Alliance and together we lobby the State Government for financial, policy and project support. To this end, ERA Councils will be lobbying leading up to next year's State election about issues to do with waste management, the need for more sporting grounds, better canopy cover and development.

For the first time too, as an initiative of our CEO, Council has launched its own Advocacy Plan, which you can find on our website. The Advocacy Plan is a strategic approach that Council is using to influence decision-makers at the state and federal levels to secure funding and policy support for key projects and the most pressing policy issues facing our city. Council is advocating by making representations to governments, engaging with Members of Parliament, Ministers and candidates to form strategic partnerships and pursue grant funding. Two of the major ones are the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass and The Regal Theatre precinct upgrade. The Plan also presents a number of smaller neighbourhood level projects which may be taken up for support by local candidates during the election.

CEO's Message



Burnside Community Renewables Program

Council is pleased to introduce the Burnside Community Renewables Program, aimed at helping residents and businesses reduce electricity costs and lower emissions by making it easier to access solar and battery systems.

Through this program, Council has engaged South Australian manufacturer Tindo Solar to provide solar and battery installation services. Residents and businesses within the City of Burnside can now access exclusive offers and expert advice through this local provider.

This initiative supports Council's Environmental Sustainability Strategy and Strategic Community Plan, particularly our goal to help the community reduce greenhouse gas emissions. We have heard from many residents that the renewable energy market can be confusing, but this program is designed to provide a clear, reliable option for getting started.

All property owners in Burnside are eligible and renters are encouraged to register their interest as well.

Organics Trial Update

This month marks the exciting expansion of our weekly green organics collection trial. From Monday 8 September 2025 households and businesses within the trial zone will start a weekly green organic collection and fortnightly landfill and recycling collection. This expansion will bring in around 3,000 additional households and businesses to the trial. See page 6-7 for more information.

Following a highly successful first year, which saw strong community participation in the trial and a significant reduction in landfill waste, this next phase continues our commitment to environmental sustainability. Most red bins in the trial have been going out half full or less, so this adjustment makes both environmental and economic sense. The expanded trial will run through to June 2026, with the potential to continue beyond that depending on future budget decisions

Advocacy Plan

Council continues to progress its Advocacy Plan in the lead-up to the state election, with ongoing engagement with government representatives.

The plan remains focused on key community priorities, including the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass, Regal Theatre upgrade, precinct planning and funding for valued local services such as the library and Toy Library.

Recent weeks have involved productive discussions with both State and Federal members of both major parties, helping to raise awareness of Burnside's priorities and position our city for future funding opportunities. We will continue advocating strongly on behalf of our community.

To help share these priorities, I've also been featuring in short videos alongside Council Members on the City of Burnside Facebook and Instagram pages, highlighting the key projects being championed. I encourage you to visit our pages to hear more about what we're advocating for and why it matters to our city.

Glenside Lions Spark \$100,000 Drought Relief

A call to action from Glenside Lions Club has led to a \$100,000 drought relief effort supporting farmers on South Australia's Eyre Peninsula.

The initiative began in early June 2025, when Glenside Lions Secretary Malcolm Schluter was moved by a radio segment highlighting the worsening conditions faced by West Coast farmers.

The Glenside Lions donated \$30,000 to purchase stock feed from Cummins Mill, supplying 38 farmers with one tonne of sheep pellets each. Inspired by their actions, the Richmond Lions Club soon matched the contribution with the Lions Clubs International Foundation contributing a further \$40,000 - bringing the total to \$100,000 and extending support to 101 drought-affected farmers.

Weekly Organics Expands to the Monday **Collection Area**

Council is trialling the weekly collection of organics bins. Since the trial began in September 2024, households and businesses have embraced the opportunity to have food scraps and garden waste collected each week. As a result, landfill has been reduced by 200 tonnes compared to the previous financial year. Which is a win for the environment and the community.

Weekly organics collection is useful because it makes it easier for people to use their green bins for food scraps, which are then sent for composting. This leads to savings because the composting of food waste is around five times cheaper than sending it to landfill. These savings help reduce pressure on Council's waste management budget and, in turn, on rates.

Building on the success of the trial, weekly organics is now being extended to the Monday bin collection area. This will include households and businesses in Beulah Park, Kensington Park, Kensington Gardens and Magill. Residents in this area should have already received information about the trial.

How It Works

Households and businesses in the trial area will have their green organics bins collected weekly and red-lidded landfill bins collected fortnightly, with no change to the recycling bin. Most household waste is organic waste from the kitchen and the garden. Therefore, it makes sense to have weekly green organics collection. While most households are ready for this change, Council is providing additional support for households where needed.

What do our residents think?



Community support has been key to the success of the trial. From saving money to reducing landfill, residents have embraced the change and are seeing the benefits.

Why Weekly Organics Works

Easier to dispose of food scraps. Weekly green organics collection means households can send all food scraps to be composted without having to worry about smell or waiting another week for collection.

Takes the pressure off rates. Weekly organics collection makes it easier to use the green bin for food scraps. With more food scraps in the green bins, Council saves money.

Most landfill bins are half full. Because most landfill bins are half full or less, they don't need to be emptied each week.

Better for businesses. Composting creates local jobs. Putting food and garden waste in your green bin grows the local composting industry. The compost helps increase the productivity of South Australian farms and vineyards.

Better for the environment. When food scraps are composted they breaks down quickly. In contrast, when food scraps go to landfill they breaks down slowly and releases methane, a powerful greenhouse gas.

Reduces landfill. Our trial has shown weekly organics significantly reduces landfill. A weekly service makes it easier to put all food scraps and organic waste in the green organics bin.

What's Next?

This service is expected to continue beyond the trial and expand to other areas, subject to future Council budgets and the ongoing success of the program. Residents will be notified in advance of any further changes.

Council thanks residents for embracing weekly organics. Your efforts are helping to reduce landfill, save money and support responsible waste management.

Digital Imaging Project, Digitising **Your Memories**

It started with a simple slideshow. An elderly man, living with advanced dementia, had long since withdrawn from those around him, until familiar faces flickered onto his TV screen.

As old family photos appeared, something shifted. Eyes fixed on the images, for a few brief moments, the past cut through the fog.

'It was like a switch flipped,' said Mike Neal, President of the Lions Club of Burnside. 'He was captivated by the photos he hadn't seen in years. That was a moment that really, really drove me. We thought, "We have the tools to do this, we know what needs to be done - we have to make this work."'

'The impact that day had will never leave me.'

That moment sparked the Digital Imaging Project; a free service offered by the Lions Club to help Burnside's elderly residents scan and digitise old photo slides and printed pictures. The aim is simple: make it easier to preserve and share precious memories, without the stress of navigating unfamiliar technology.





'There's both a technological barrier and a sheer amount of photos barrier,' Mike said. 'This whole concept can overwhelm people. They see me do it and they say, "Oh yeah, he knows what he's doing." But if I can sit down with someone and show them, run them through how to do it, it becomes manageable. Once they start making progress, they can get it done."

Mike speaks from experience. 'When I first retired it was my ambition to get this done for myself. I had a big plastic tub full of slides. I looked at it a number of times, but I just kept pushing it back.'

To break down the barrier, the Lions provide hands-on help and lend out portable scanners small, affordable machines residents can use at home once they've had a demonstration.

'My focus is on how quick and, from a technology aspect, how easy it is,' Mike said. 'Modern computers are smart enough that you don't need expertise. This is quick and easy.'

Digitising images has clear benefits including better preservation, easier sharing, and peace of mind. 'Once people see it and fully appreciate what you can do once the photos are digitised - you're not all limited to crowding around the photo album.'

'You can take the smart photo frames to relatives in hospital or care homes. You can send them to people overseas. If you have the misfortune of a fire or disaster, once you get everything sorted you can get copies from family. They're not gone forever."

So far, only a small number of residents have accessed the program. But Mike hopes more will give it a go.

'This is about making people aware that it's doable, and you can do it in a reasonable amount of time. Once you're comfortable and know what you're doing, we let you take the machine home and do the project on your own time - just give me a call if you have any problems.'

Celebrating 30 Years of Play

On 22 October 2025, the Burnside Toy Library turns 30 - marking three decades of fun, learning and connection for local families.

It's a milestone worth celebrating for one of Australia's most vibrant and successful toy libraries.

Originally located in a small building at Glenunga Reserve next to the playground (which still exists today), the Toy Library was open just 10 hours per week. In 2012, it was relocated to its current home inside the Burnside Library at the Civic Centre, allowing it to expand opening hours to over 54 per week and better serve the growing community.

Now featuring a wonderful collection of more than 4,000 toys, the Toy Library supports over 1,500 members and is designed primarily for children aged from birth to five. Baby toys, board games, puzzles, scooters and bikes, dress-up costumes, puppets, pretend play sets and construction toys are just some of the items on offer. With so many choices, children can experience a wide variety of play opportunities that evolve with their developmental needs.

Toy libraries offer more than just entertainment; they provide a sustainable and affordable way for families to learn and grow through play. The Burnside Toy Library is a shining example, having won national awards, including the prestigious Toy Library Excellence Award from Toy Libraries Australia.

In the last financial year alone, a staggering 28,271 toys were borrowed by 1,640 families – a testament to the Toy Library's enduring popularity and value. With both 3-month and 12-month family memberships available (starting at just \$45 for a year), it's an accessible and eco-friendly way to keep playtime fresh without the clutter or cost of constantly buying new toys.

Balancing Growth and Character: Our Thoughts on Glenside

We've been hearing from many of you about the 20-storey proposal in Glenside. Like you, we were surprised — and disappointed — when Cedar Woods shifted from what they originally told the community. Residents bought into this development on the understanding it would be mediumrise, not a high-rise. Trust matters, and when developers change course, it erodes confidence.

But alongside that, we need to ask ourselves: if not here, then where? Adelaide's growing, whether we like it or not. If we don't plan for that growth smartly, it turns up in places we didn't expect — and often, places far less suited

Protecting Our Neighbourhoods by Planning for Growth in the Right Places

We're seeing it already across Burnside: older homes knocked down, big leafy blocks chopped up, and townhouses squeezed onto narrow streets. These aren't bad people buying or building — they're just trying to find a place to live. But without well-planned alternatives, the pressure on our heritage streetscapes and infrastructure will only increase.

Glenside was always meant to take some of this pressure. It's a new precinct, close to transport, close to the city, with infrastructure already upgraded for growth. Admittedly, those upgrades were based on a medium-density development, not a 20-storey tower, so there are legitimate questions about how well the current infrastructure will cope with more residents. But let's be honest — the local roads, pipes and schools are better placed to adapt here than they are in the middle of Linden Park or Beaumont.

That's why Burnside Council developed a City Master Plan, offering to trade greater development intensity on arterial roads in return for greater planning protections in the hinterland. So it's disappointing that Minister Champion knocked back Council's proposed code amendment while approving Cedar Woods.

A Climate and Housing Reality

Let's also remember the climate side of this. Every time new housing sprawls further out on Adelaide's fringes, it clears habitat, creates long car commutes, and locks in higher emissions.

And as Burnside property prices continue to climb, we have to ask: who are we building our suburbs for? Many people in Burnside are rattling around in the old family home because there is nowhere suitable in the area to downsize to. Higher-density housing done well gives essential workers, young people, and down-sizers a chance to stay in the area, close to the places and people they love.

But Developers Must Do Better

This doesn't mean giving developers a free pass. Cedar Woods' shift from their original plan has damaged trust. Community consultation must be meaningful, not a box-ticking exercise. And any new buildings should be beautifully designed, respectful of their surroundings, and supported by the infrastructure they need.

The Choice Before Us

We can have no growth — and watch our kids priced out and the sprawl roll on. Or we can plan smarter, concentrated housing where it is needed, and protect the places we hold dear.

Let's keep this conversation open and honest.

It's fantastic to be able to update progress with some significant Environmental issues. We have a new Community Renewables Program to reduce emissions and electricity costs for our ratepayers. Tindo Solar, a SA company which manufactures locally, is appointed to deliver this service in Burnside by offering exclusive rates on photovoltaic solar systems and battery storage solutions designed to help lower cost of living and cost of business pressures and support emissions reductions. See further details in this Focus edition on how you can access.

We are also continuing progress with the Trial of the Green Organics Weekly Bin Collection which has received great community uptake in the Beulah and Kensington Parks Trial households. It's a credit to our community that they have volunteered to participate to show what is possible as most households do not need weekly red landfill bin collection and diverting organics collection to weekly instead has environmental benefits and reduces Council costs.

I'm also keen that we introduce a Repair Café at Burnside for community members to learn how to repair small household items and keep these from landfill.

Finally, our precinct management planning aims to address parking in our suburbs, particularly the congestion in our older ones with narrow streets and little off street parking. This is a big challenge for Council with careful management needed, in co operation with the community, to achieve equitable and fair use of our roads to protect both residential and business amenity.

We've also made strong progress on the Burnside Village redevelopment — a project set to redefine our retail heart. Looking ahead, I see huge potential to grow our tourism footprint. With Penfolds Winery, Mount Osmond Golf Course, and Burnside Village, we have a "tourism trifecta" ready to shine.

Burnside's future is being shaped now — by all of us. Let's keep the conversation going.

Regal Theatre Redevelopment

The Regal Theatre Precinct redevelopment began with extensive community consultation and was formally endorsed by Council in August 2022.

The detailed design, developed with input from residents, Council Members, stakeholders and Heritage SA, aligns with the original Master Plan and includes significant upgrades to the theatre and surrounding public space.

The Regal Theatre, a beloved cultural landmark in Adelaide, has played a central role in the community's arts and entertainment scene for generations. Originally opened in November 1925, it will celebrate its centenary this year, marking 100 years of history, heritage, and performance. The redevelopment honours this legacy while preparing the precinct for a vibrant future.

The project will deliver a range of improvements, including a modernised theatre stage, upgraded equipment and a new greenroom to attract more diverse performances. The fover will be reconfigured to enhance accessibility and restore heritage features. Outdoor areas will be transformed with new paving, landscaping, ambient lighting and dining spaces. The historic cottage will be restored and repurposed with new toilets, a kitchen and storage area, while a new retail or café shopfront will be created. Accessibility will be improved through DDA-compliant ramps, wider paths and better parking. Sustainability features include rainwater storage, permeable paving and potential solar panel installation.

Environmental considerations have been central to the design. While some existing trees that impact accessibility need to be removed, the plan includes a net increase of approximately 11 trees, 190 m² of new green space and enhanced lawn and garden areas. These changes aim to balance ecological sustainability with the practical needs of the site and its heritage elements.

Council has successfully secured \$2.4 million in funding through the Federal Government's Thriving Suburbs Program. To ensure the successful delivery and enhanced impact of the project, Council is actively exploring additional funding opportunities to complement this grant.

Community engagement will continue through public notification during the development application process, inclusion in the 2026/27 Draft Annual Business Plan and Budget and direct communication with residents via letterbox drops and social media once construction nears.





Have Your Say

Precinct Plans: Rose Park, Dulwich, Toorak Gardens, Frewville, Eastwood, and Glenunga

Council is preparing precinct plans to improve transport safety, accessibility and liveability in Rose Park, Dulwich, Toorak Gardens, Frewville, Eastwood and Glenunga. These plans will include proposed enhancements to local neighbourhoods, such as improved pedestrian and cyclist safety, and habitats and streetscapes, while also addressing key traffic and road safety concerns. Following initial engagement in 2024 asking people to identify issues and opportunities in their local streets, Council will shortly be consulting with the community on the draft precinct plans.

These plans will set out the actions Council proposes to take to create safer, greener streets in the suburbs of Rose Park, Dulwich, Toorak Gardens, Frewville, Eastwood and Glenunga. The plans will present initiatives to address key existing traffic and road safety issues, including speeding, excessive traffic volumes, pedestrian and cyclist safety and through traffic. The plans will also present opportunities for improvements to the streetscapes, such as increased plantings of trees and shrubs, biodiversity corridors and enhanced pedestrian access to local places of interest.


